THEME OF THE WEEK: The Righteousness Born of Baptismal Grace

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 5:20-26 A Crushing Burden

"This is the Gospel of the Lord." It is important to remember that our Lord said these very things. These weren't just for the "evil" scribes and pharisees. They're for us. Jesus expands the requirements of the Law to include the mind and heart. This righteousness is something no one can hope to obtain. And that's just the point – righteousness is not something for us to create or earn. It comes to us only through our Lord Jesus Christ Himself for HE is the righteousness of God. Our righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and pharisees only because we are in Christ and His righteousness is ours. O Lord, keep me in Your word and in Your righteousness through faith that I may be counted as righteous on the Last Day. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Ps 119, sixth part (WAW v41-48) - God's Mercy to His People

Yesterday we had Law in the New Testament and now we have Gospel in the Old Testament! This helps us see the true depth of God's Word. God's Law and Gospel are everywhere in Scripture. The language of this portion of the Psalm are statements of faith. They are not idle hopes or dreams. It is certain that God will do what He is asked in this Psalm. In the same way, we pray to God knowing that out of His love and goodness, He will give us what is necessary. His steadfast love never departs from us. He continually comes to us in His Word. All this He does out of divine, fatherly love for us. It is important for us to remember that we approach God with confidence when we pray. O Lord, be with me, Your servant. Grant me to always trust in You above all else. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Romans 6:3-11 – It's All Coming Together

This text serves as the turning point in our week. This brings together what we saw on Sunday and Monday. How is it that Jesus can expand the Law and yet we can be righteous? How and why can we approach God in confidence knowing that He will hear and answer our prayers? It's all here in Romans 6. These things are true because of the new, righteous life that is ours in Baptism. Through the waters of Holy Baptism we are made His new people, righteous, and clean. This is what He does for us. It isn't something that we earn, but something that He does because he loves us. O Lord, thank You for calling me to be Your child and making me Your new creation through Baptism. Keep me in this faith by Your grace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Exodus 20:1-17 - We Get to Serve

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 19:16-30 - So, You Want to be Perfect?

Sell everything and come, follow me. What a wonderful invitation from Jesus. Many of us today as modern Christians are convinced that we would never fail our Lord in this way and we would be sure to go when invited. Yet there were many who saw Jesus and heard Him teach who did not follow Him. How can we hope to be faithful? How can we be perfect? Only through faith in Him. Jesus not only calls us to follow Him, but He gives us the faith to do so through the work of the Holy Spirit. So let us faithfully follow Jesus for He is the source of all our good. *O Lord, You are the living source of all the blessings in my life.*

Give me the eyes to see the blessings You have given and joy in all that You have done and continue to do for me. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Ephesians 2:4-10 – Christ's Riches, Not Ours

These words are likely familiar to many readers. Lutherans often will turn to them as the basis for our understanding of justification as something God does, not us. But there is more in the text. Paul speaks of God's mercy in the analogy of riches. In this way of thinking, God is the only truly wealthy being. All goodness, righteousness, and goodness are His. And He willingly shares this with us. He rejoices to bless His people, calling us to faith in Christ Jesus and making us His own through baptism and making us heirs of His kingdom of righteousness. O Lord, all good that I have comes from You. You have blessed me immensely thus far in my life and I ask that You would give me the eyes to see Your goodness in my own life. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 114 - Name Above All Names

We conclude this week with a wonderful Psalm reminding us of the glory of God. He grants new life, righteousness, and holiness to all of His people because these qualities are His. Because of His mercy and goodness, He is worthy of praise. This is in addition to His glory as creator of the universe. He has indeed raised up a horn for His people, the message of the Gospel through which He calls the world back to Himself. It is through the Gospel that He has called us and made us His own people. Thanks be to God! O Lord, You are worthy of all praise. It is through Your goodness that You have made me new in You. Be with me and bless me that I may remain steadfast in You and Your glory. Amen.
