Around the Word Devotions + the week of June 2-8, 2024

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Spirit's Words in Holy Scripture

God makes it clear to us this week that the things of the Gospel. The gifts that He gives are far more than the temporal things that we can see and touch and hold close. While 1st Article gifts are still blessings from above, the sinner likes to focus on the gift and forget about the Giver, thus no longer seeing it as gift and boasting in himself. And so throughout this week Your Lord will remind you, that you do not live on bread alone, that your treasures are more than earthy baubles, and that a person of faith takes delight in the things of heaven: chiefly in the gift of life and salvation that he receives from His Savior. And it is

these things that necessarily spill over into love and service for the neighbor; not for the doer's good, but for the neighbor's.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 16:19-31—Moses and the Prophets

Jesus is clear in this parable, that Moses and the Prophets hold all that is necessary for eternal life. That is to say that the Word of God, first the Old Testament and then the New, is the means by which the Holy Spirit creates, enlivens, and sustains faith. Not even a man come back from the grave (Jesus is tipping His hat to His own resurrection, here) will be enough to convince those who have hardened their hearts to the preaching of the forgiveness of sins from a merciful God. Those who are content to go it their own should not be surprised on his last day when alone is how they stand. But for those who have a name, a name like Lazarus, a name given and gifted through faith by our most gracious

Lord, they need never fear death. "Lord, let at last Thine angels come, to Abr'ham's bosom bear me home." Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Genesis 15:1-6—As the Stars of the Sky

TUE

Already an old man when God first promised him a son, we find Abraham still waiting for the culmination of that promise in our text for today. He still has another couple of decades and more than a few more slip-ups before Isaac comes bouncing along in his bassinet. But even Isaac isn't the final fulfillment of God's promise. That happens when God takes on human flesh and makes the descendants of Abraham (through faith) more numerous than the stars in the sky. You see, God's covenant with Abraham isn't so much to do with Abraham's faithfulness, but it has everything to do with His faithfulness to His promise, which, of course, He never breaks. And so even here, staring up into the night sky, the

Word of the Lord is pointing to Himself, in the person of Christ. Lord, grant me faith to believe Your promises. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 1 John 4:16-21—Loving God = Loving Your Neighbor

You can't have one without the other, that is what John is trying to get across to us in this text. And it makes sense, of course, for one who is forgiven, forgives. He can do no other. And because of this the one who is loved by God, in turn loves. And He doesn't just love God, but in loving God He loves His neighbor. For God doesn't need our love, or our service, but our neighbors sure do. It is almost as if this is the way in which our Lord set it up in the first place: That He would care for His people, partly through the loves that we have for each other. To be in Christ means that we love each other, there can be no other way, for believing that Christ and hatred are compatible is ridiculous. The One who loves us to the point of death would also in turn have us love our neighbors with forgiveness and truth. Jesus, help us love our neighbors as we ought. Amen.

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WED

SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 9:23, 24—What we should boast in

The sinner always wants to boast in the stuff that he has or the things that he does. He likes to look at his brains and his brawn, his bank account and his pocketbook and then brag unto all the world about how wonderful he is. Never once, though, does the sinner recognize that all these things are but gifts from his Lord and can be taken away at any time. And believe me, God will most certainly take them all away one day, and yet He does so graciously so that we might recognize that we have nothing to boast about except Him. It is our God's aim to have us boast in the only thing that can bring us salvation, and that, of course, is Him. For it is the Lord Who practices steadfast love for the sinner, granting us righteousness before His eyes with a justice that doesn't make sense

to our minds, but makes sense in the light of the Gospel. God, may we boast in nothing except Christ. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Luke 12:13-21—Treasures

I doubt the man at the beginning of our text was happy with the parable that Jesus told. All he wanted was his slice of the pie, at least the slice he thought was due him, and his brother obviously felt different. But isn't this the way of the sinner, always worrying about the temporal things of this world, which in the end do not matter. "Do I have enough socked away? Is the nest egg big enough when everything around me cracks?" Now Jesus isn't telling us to be careless about these things, but he is telling us that if all we care about is the nest egg, He will make sure to break it before it does us any good. For what good is a lifetime's worth of money when we have spurned the things of eternity as if they have no worth. There are better things, by far, than a big of barn full of

grain. May our Lord make us aware of this fact. Jesus, set our eyes on things above. Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: 1 Timothy 6:6-19—The Love of Money

It's the pleasant things of this world, the 1st Article gifts that our Lord actually supplies for us, that the sinner goes and turns into the most evil of things. And again, it isn't the gift that is evil, but our twisted desire for it above all other things and in places where it is not ours to have. But as for the man of faith, the saint God has made us to be, these pleasures should not be what wakes us up in the morning and drives us throughout the day. Instead, the things of the Gospel: righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, and gentleness, must guide our hearts and our minds, indeed, they must. For the saint in Christ desires such things and fights the fight of faith against the sinner within who wants the other stuff. And so it is a daily struggle, a daily drowning of the Old

Adam by the new, bearing witness to the promises of God. God, may we fight the good fight of faith. Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:1-8 (ALEPH)—Do not Forsake Me

O Lord, You have blessed all those who walk according to Your law, whose ways are blameless, and whose desires are in accordance with Your Word. And so You boss those who seek You and Your testimonies with their whole heart, not partially, but fully, without blemish. Without any hint of wrong. For you have set Your precepts aright and so they are good and holy, to be kept without question. And yet, it is impossible for me to do so, even if it is my desire, even if I know it is for my ultimate good, I can no more keep Your law than give myself breath. There is no one righteous, no not one born of man, except for your Son, Who You sent to do what we sinner could not. And so it is He Who keeps Your precepts and delights in Your law so that His righteousness might be our own and that Your law can finally be seen as the gift that it has always been. Grant this to us all, for the sake of Christ. Amen.

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
